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Chicago style no longer prefers the use of “ibid.” Instead, use the author’s last name and a shortened title of no more than 5 words to cite sources that have previously been cited (e.g., “Coward, *Thomas Pynchon*, 12”).

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Use block formatting for prose quotations of 100 or more words and verse quotations of two lines or more. If you wish to use section breaks, include one blank line before including your section header or beginning your next paragraph.

When joining two independent clauses with a colon, do not capitalize the first word of the second independent clause. (This is a departure from Chicago style, which calls for the first word of the second to be capitalized.)

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
