Guidelines for Accepted Articles

Please follow these guidelines to prepare your article for copyediting. Manuscripts that do not comport with these guidelines may be returned for additional revision prior to copyediting.

Style and Audience

Clio generally follows Chicago style (18th edition), with a few exceptions, some of which are addressed below. Your article should be written in formal tone; please avoid directly addressing readers as "you" and avoid the use of contractions. The audience for your article will be interdisciplinary; please avoid the use of undefined jargon and please provide contextualizing information about, say, characters with whom any given reader may be unfamiliar.

Quotations, Translations, and Permissions

As the author, you are responsible for ensuring the accuracy of quotations and (your own) translations. This includes the accuracy of citations for quoted or otherwise cited materials. You are also responsible for obtaining and providing to *Clio*'s managing editor all necessary permissions for reproduced materials that do not qualify as "Fair Use."

Languages

Please use U.S. English spelling and usage conventions (to the extent that you are comfortable doing so; our copyeditors can revise other dialects for U.S. English as needed), except in quotations. If your article includes text in any language other than English, please provide authoritative translations (or your own) in parentheses and cite the translator. Non-English book and article titles mentioned in the text or cited should be followed immediately by English translations in parentheses. Adhere strictly to the conventions of any foreign language used; we depend on you for accuracy.

Citation Style

Please format your citations in Chicago style as footnotes (a bibliography is not necessary).

Parenthetical references can be used to cite sources that are cited at least three times in your article. Use a footnote to provide a full citation the first time that you need to cite such a source, then immediately follow that citation with "Hereafter cited as <author's last name>, <a shortened title of no more than 5 words>."

Chicago style no longer prefers the use of "ibid." Instead, use the author's last name and a shortened title of no more than 5 words to cite sources that have previously been cited (e.g., "Cowart, *Thomas Pynchon*, 12").

Clio includes place of publication in citations (although Chicago style makes this optional).

Clio uses inclusive page ranges in citations for journal articles and book chapters upon their first footnote citation. We also abbreviate both volume and issue numbers in journal-article citations and "University" and "Press" in publisher names. Use the following examples as guidelines for preparing your citations:

Journal article: Vlasta Vranjes, "Jane Austen, Lord Hardwicke's Marriage Act, and the National Courtship Plot," *Clio: A Journal of Literature, History, and the Philosophy of History* 43.2 (2014): 197–223, 221.

Book: David Cowart, *Thomas Pynchon and the Dark Passages of History* (Athens: U of Georgia P), 12.

Book chapter: Paul Edwards, "Wyndham Lewis and the Uses of Shellshock: Meat and Postmodernism," in *Wyndham Lewis and the Cultures of Modernity*, ed. Andrzej Gasiorek, Alice Reeve-Tucker, and Nathan Waddell (Farnham, UK: Ashgate, 2011), 223–40, 227.

Format and Punctuation

Use block formatting for prose quotations of 100 or more words and verse quotations of two lines or more. If you wish to use section breaks, include one blank line before including your section header or beginning your next paragraph.

When joining two independent clauses with a colon, do not capitalize the first word of the second independent clause. (This is a departure from Chicago style, which calls for the first word of the second to be capitalized.)

Additional Information/Requirements

- Contributor's Bio: When you send your article to us for copyediting, please attach a separate file with a biographical statement of fewer than 100 words. This statement should contain your affiliation, title(s), institutional affiliation, area(s) of specialization, and most significant publications (include a year of publication for all books) or area(s) of current research.
- *Minimizing footnotes*: *Clio*'s production staff asks that you please try to keep explanatory footnotes (as opposed to citations) to only the most essential ones, while simultaneously doing your best to limit the length of individual footnotes as well. Whenever possible, please try to keep the essay's analysis in the body of the paper rather than in footnotes.
- *Copyright*: All work accepted for publication in *Clio* becomes the property of the journal under a standard copyright agreement. Authors may reprint their own work, but

permission must be obtained from *Clio* prior to publication. If royalties or other remuneration is received for reprinted articles or reviews, such payments will be evenly split between the journal and the author (if the journal has a current address for the author).
