TRIO Student-of-the-Year:

Graciela Jimenez

Graciela Jimenez grew up in Richardson, Texas-but both her mother and father have strong ties to Mexico. Her early years offered some of her best life experiences and unfortunately some of her worst. Grace's childhood was not without struggle. Her family dealt with substance abuse issues which created many traumatic events for Grace at a young age. As an adolescent, she spent time with her family in a homeless shelter. After her parent's divorce, Grace moved to Goshen, Indiana with her mom and siblings. It was then that her home life began to stabilize more.

Despite all the struggles she and her family faced, Grace always felt her mom was a strong support in her life. Grace recalls that her mom always prided herself in the accomplishments of her children and the joy she saw in her mom during those moments stayed with her all through the years. In fact, Grace's mom and a family friend really pushed Grace to consider college after high school.

Like many first-generation college students, Grace says, "College was never in my head growing up." It wasn't until high school she started thinking about furthering her education. From a young age, Grace dreamed of being a teacher, judge, or business owner; but it wasn't until a 4th grade science class that Grace really found her passion. It was that spark in elementary school that sent Grace on a path toward a science degree.

Grace chose Purdue Fort Wayne as her college because of its close proximity to



family and the affordability it could provide her. She also liked the idea of being on a smaller campus where she could build connections with professors easily while studying microbiology and immunology.

Grace graduated in May with a B.S. degree in Biology with a concentration in Microbiology and Immunology and an A.S. degree in Chemistry. She is currently working as a Microbiology Lab Technician at Biodyne-USA. She plans to work for a few years and then apply to a Master's degree program in Texas.

Grace would like others to know, "No matter how bad it gets, don't give up. Think of what you want for yourself and your future...and how you're going to get there." She continues, "It took more than one person's help for me to get where I am today." Grace credits her family, friends, TRIO, and faculty for helping her persist to earn her degrees.

Abby shared that TRIO helped her learn how to work with people she now serves in her career field. Learning how to manage her time and multitask have also been very beneficial in her current career. Abby shared that TRIO was like family to her. TRIO was her first job and staff even helped her learn how to drive a car. She also noted how TRIO helped her experience cultural activities that she otherwise would not have had the chance to. She would like to remind new students to get involved on campus! "Use the time you have to utilize all the resources around you. Being in college can be the time to learn about new or different things and you might be surprised and end up finding something you love."

During the process of becoming citizens, Jon's parents faced struggles brought on by having to learn a completely new language. Although Jon notes he and his siblings learned English more easily being immersed in American culture and schools, his parent's path was more difficult. Jon recalls times having to go to the doctor, tax office, and other grown-up places to help act as a translator for his parents while still a young child.


Despite the challenges his family faced adjusting to a new language and culture, Jon recalls his family telling him college would offer a better career path than the one his parents had to take and could take him farther in life.

Jon credits his early childhood experience with helping him develop independence and a strong work ethic. One of Jon's biggest motivations for getting his degrees includes wanting to be a good role model for his siblings—letting them know they can also pursue education as a way to a better life.

During college, Jon was involved with TRIO, Hispanos Unidos, IEEE, Soccer Club, IEEE Electrical Vehicle Project, and was the recipient of a National Science Foundation Scholarship.

Jon graduated in May 2021 with a B.S. degree in Electrical and Computer Engineering and a minor in Math. In May 2022, Jon completed his M.S. degree in Electrical Engineering. He is currently working as a VA/VE Engineer Technician at Nidec.

Jon encourages other first-generation students to "Be determined in the path you are taking...and if you're not sure, ask as many questions as it takes...it's okay not to know everything, no one does."

ROCK ON

In May, TRIO explored Cleveland, Ohio. At the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, students toured exhibition halls and learned about musical artists and the history of many American music genres. At the Pro Football Hall of Fame, students were able to get an up-close view the Lombardi Super Bowl trophy, championship rings, and busts of Hall of Famers. Students could even watch past Super Bowl Games in the museum's theater, TRIO student, Hai Nguyen, shared that, "This trip brought new experiences...exploring a city with a group of people helped me connect with others. This was outside of my comfort zone but still would not have it any other way." Another student, Aseel Batuq, shared that he enjoyed how, "people appreciate other people's work and value it, whether they were football players or musicians."

HISTORY ALIVE

In June, TRIO took a deep dive into history. Students traveled to Detroit, Michigan to visit the Henry Ford Museum and the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History. Students visited Rosa Parks bus, saw presidential vehicles, and learned about American innovation throughout the years. At the Charles Wright Museum, students learned about the complex African-American experience including learning about the Slave Trade and explored exhibits documenting the Civil Rights Movement, TRIO student, Jared Ragsdale, said, "Walking through the slave trade portion of the And Still We Rise exhibit gave me—a white male perspective as to what the ancestors of friends and family suffered through. Prior to this trip, I'd read about the slave trade in history books but walking through the interactive exhibit that immersed you in the process was a sobering experience."

Austin Brandenberger

Austin Brandenberger will conduct research in quantum and material physics this summer for 10 weeks at Montana State University in Bozeman. He is attending with Brian D'Urso, who is an associate professor of optomechanics, quantum optics, precision measurements, and atomic physics at the University. He was chosen for the National Science Foundation's Research Experiences for Undergraduates program based on his academic and research records. This program only awards a few hundred winners nationwide. Austin will be "implementing a feedback cooling algorithm that slows down particles trapped with Magnetic fields" and working with "magnetio-gravitational traps".



To Ko Htay

Toko Htay participated in the Student Research Symposium during spring semester. In his research, he discussed Mycobacterium abscessus that can cause severe infectious disease in humans. He states that "M. abscessus can form biofilms, which are large communities of cells and are usually resistant to most antibiotics." Toko investigated the role that efflux pumps have in biofilm formation and found that the "effectiveness of different efflux pump inhibitors (EPIs) against biofilm formation will benefit in the development of new antibiotics to treat M. abscessus infections."




Annual TRIO Picnic
