TRIO Student-of-the-Year: Jo'Male Collier



Jo'Male Collier grew up in South Bend, Indiana. As a child, he often dreamed about becoming a doctor. Born with Osteogenesis Imperfecta, commonly known as Brittle Bone Disease, Jo'Male spent much of his childhood in the care of doctors. His disease inspired curiosity—he often wondered about how and why Osteogenesis Imperfecta affected his health as it did.

Jo'Male learned at an early age that one cannot become a doctor without hard work and dedication. He not only wanted to earn good grades for his future, but also to make his parents proud. He enjoyed praise from his mother and father, and felt ecstatic when he brought home medals and award certificates. He desired to be the student who knew every answer in class, and often times, he was. His parents were incredibly proud of Jo'Male, and would often brag to neighbors and friends about his accomplishments. Jo'Male and his sister were his parents' most celebrated achievements.

However, family life was not always easy and carefree. Some days were very difficult, and at times, Jo'Male's family would split due to arguments and stress. Jo'Male had just begun high school when he experienced a devastating loss. In June 2011, at the age of 15, Jo'Male's father, the man he respected and loved beyond measure, passed away unexpectedly. Jo'Male and his sister came to Fort Wayne to live with his aunt. Depression mounted as Jo'Male grieved the loss of his father and tried to adjust to this life-altering event. His loss, along with the transition to a new home and high school, made life very challenging. Jo'Male's motivation to learn and succeed waned.

Jo'Male found comfort in his family, and eventually, in TRIO Upward Bound. Jo'Male had heard about TRIO Upward Bound through North Side High School but was not interested in the program initially. He thought it would cause additional stress and pressure in his life; however, when he took the leap and joined the program, he found what he needed. While in TRIO Upward Bound, Jo'Male made lifelong friends and relationships with people who cared about him and his future. He enjoyed the summer programs, where he could attend school and live with his peers in college housing. He began to have an idea of what it would be like to further his education beyond high school and his motivation began to come alive again. TRIO Upward Bound helped Jo'Male to propel forward, reviving his dream of becoming a doctor.

In the fall of 2015, Jo'Male began his first semester at Purdue Fort Wayne (at the time Indiana University-Purdue University Fort Wayne), majoring in Biology with a concentration in Genetic Cell Molecular Biology. He joined TRIO Student Support Services and became very involved on campus. He attended TRIO workshops and cultural trips, worked on-campus jobs, and volunteered at numerous campus and TRIO events. He has been a strong participant in TRIO, and an advocate for TRIO and first-generation college students. He has authored stories for the TRIO book: *Every Student Has a Story*, served on the leadership team in TRIO Club, completed the TRIO Leaders program, served as a peer mentor for other TRIO students, helped lead a service trip to Puerto Rico, and worked as a TRIO student worker, and a tour guide for the office of Admissions. This year TRIO recognized Jo'Male for his many accomplishments and involvement as a TRIO Student-of-the-Year.

Although the road to and through college was not an easy one, Jo'Male kept his determination intact. He worked incredibly hard and overcame obstacles, all while keeping a positive attitude and sharing his contagious laugh. In May of this year, Jo'Male crossed the stage, earning his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology with a concentration in Genetics. He is determined to work towards a second degree in genetic counseling because of his strong desire to help those who struggle with genetic disorders. Currently, Jo'Male plans on working in a laboratory for a year, and then will attend IUPUI for graduate school next fall. Jo'Male is an inspiration to other first-generation college students for his tenacity, perseverance, and positive attitude. We are all proud to see what he has accomplished—still making his father proud!

Volunteer/Community Activities: Over the past 2 years, I have been volunteering at our Navari Student Outreach Clinic (NSOC) as a medical student provider. I am also the project leader in our Diabetes program at the clinic. NSOC serves low-income and uninsured people. Most of our patients are Spanish-speaking. This past year, I was also the treasurer for American Medical Women's Association (AMWA). Throughout our school, we also volunteer once a semester at a place they choose for us. For example, I volunteered at the Homeless Center my first year and El Campito this past year. El Campito is a pre-K organization for low-income families. Studying takes up most of my day which leaves me with a few hours every day for anything other than studying.

Advice to Current TRIO Students: I don't know where you are right now in your college career, but what I do know from being a TRIO student is that feeling of being an imposter. Whether it is in school, social life, work life, or another aspect of your life, that feeling can make us feel very lonely and could potentially lead us towards isolation. However, our TRIO family is there to get us back on track. My advice is to never stop believing in yourself and to surround yourself with positive, uplifting, understanding, and supportive people. One trait I used to have was to never give up. Medical school robbed me from that trait. The amount of work in a short period of time was very overwhelming. To not fall behind, I would study all day which led me to isolate myself. Feeling overwhelmed and lonely allowed the imposter syndrome to come back. I literally called my mom and significant other crying and I told them that I wanted to give up. I stopped believing in myself and I let the stress take over my positive thoughts and slowly defeat me. However, my people helped me get out of that dark cloud and dominate my first 2 years of medical school. Looking back at it, I am still shocked and disappointed in myself that I was about to give up on this beautiful career path. Therefore, please don't let naysayers and temporary stress blind you and lock you up in a dark place. You got this! And remember you are not alone in your journey. The more meaningful connections you make with people, the more successful you will be and the farther away you will be from that deceptive feeling of being an "imposter." Also, please do not forget to enjoy your journey! Sprinkle some personalized de-stressors throughout your week.

TRIO Student-of-the-Year: Cherry Aung



Although Cherry Aung grew up in Fort Wayne, her story has strong roots in two countries far away. Cherry Aung's mom and dad are from Burma (Myanmar). During the early years of their marriage, they made the bold choice to leave Burma because of a fierce civil war that was going on in the country. The civil war was only getting worse and made conditions in Burma extremely unsafe, so Cherry's parents fled Burma and crossed over into neighboring Thailand. Cherry and her sister were born while they were in exile in Thailand. Once in Thailand; however, Cherry's parents decided that to give their daughters the best chance at a better life and education, they would have to leave Thailand too. And so, they began the immigration process to the United States.

Coming to the United States was not an easy process. A sponsoring organization helped Cherry's family through the immigration and citizenship process. Her first stop in the United States was in Indianapolis, where her family lived for two years before coming to Fort Wayne.

The language barrier was a big issue for Cherry's mom and dad when they arrived. Eventually though, they did learn how to speak and understand English. As a child, Cherry struggled trying to fit in when attending public school. Because she identified with two very different cultures and she didn't want to assimilate completely into American culture and give up her Burmese traditions, she often times felt like an outcast.

One American value her family embraced fully, however, was education. Since Cherry could remember, she always had a goal of getting her 4-year degree—no matter what it took. Her mom always told her that no matter what life may take away from her, it can never take away your education. And that always motivated her to keep moving forward in her studies.

Cherry feels that Purdue University Fort Wayne helped her with school because of how welcoming it is. While at Purdue Fort Wayne, Cherry felt surrounded by likeminded people who also wanted to better themselves and get to gradation. She also credits TRIO as being instrumental to her success while in college. In fact, Cherry says: "TRIO was my second family while in school. It was my home away from home. I truly believe that if it wasn't for TRIO, I wouldn't have thrived and done as well as I did in college. TRIO made me feel accepted and loved, more so then any other organization on campus. TRIO was a very important part of my college career and it will always have a special place in my heart."

Cherry started college at Purdue Fort Wayne in 2014 and graduated with her Bachelor of Science in Human Services degree in 2019. Currently, Cherry is working as a Case Manager at Aging and In-Home Services of Northeast Indiana. Eventually, Cherry would like to go back to graduate school for her Master's degree. She also hopes to visit Burma and Thailand in the near future with her mom and reconnect more with her Burmese culture. Best of luck in the future, Cherry!


