

# TRIO Goes to Washington, D.C.



This past July, Purdue University Fort Wayne TRIO SSS students boarded a bus for a four-day cultural trip to Washington D.C. On the first day, the group visited the FDR & MLK Memorials, White House, World War II Memorial, and Washington Monument. The students also visited the National Archives, where they were able to view the Declaration of Independence. "The sightseeing spots were great. It was amazing," said Riley Erck. The first day ended with an impactful visit to the Holocaust Museum.

Day two was just as fast-paced. The group toured Arlington Cemetery, Union Station, the Capital Building, Library of Congress, Supreme Court, Vietnam War, Korean War, and Lincoln Memorials. At Arlington National Cemetery, students observed the *Changing of the Guard* at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and a 21-gun salute at the conclusion of a veteran's funeral. Students were very moved by both experiences.

The evening was busy too, as the group enjoyed an evening tour of the Jefferson Memorial and a spectacular view from the roof of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Many students shared this was their favorite view of

Washington, D.C. with the city lights, Potomac River, and memorials lit up for evening viewing.

On Wednesday, students toured Mount Vernon, the historic home of George and Martha Washington. At Mount Vernon, three TRIO students participated in a wreath-laying ceremony at the tomb of George and Martha Washington. Students then spent the rest of the day at the Smithsonian Museums, touring in small groups. It was a whirlwind of activity and more walking than students had anticipated; however, if you ask any of them - it was a trip of a lifetime and an amazing experience! The vast majority of student attendees had never been to Washington D.C. before.



### **TRIO Alumni Steps Into Virtual Reality**





He very quickly realized there was a lot more to gaming than he had originally thought—including a huge social component and even a family component—since lot of those playing were families doing the activity together. Waylon and Brandon then created a business plan and sought out potential funders for their business ven-



ture. They ended up presenting to multiple funders before they found someone willing to invest in their idea and business. "This was the hardest part of starting a business," said Waylon, "being first-generation and lacking networks for things like that was our biggest chal-



lenge." Finally, after months of planning, Spectrum Virtual Reality Arcade opened on the southwest side of Fort Wayne in December of 2017 and has been going strong ever since. Spectrum offers patrons the chance to experience over 80+ video games in virtual reality and really feel like they're a part of the game. Spectrum also hosts tournaments and league nights and had a demonstration booth at last year's PopCon.

Waylon is a TRIO alumnus and a 2017 graduate of IPFW. He holds his Bachelor's Degree in Actuarial Science. When starting a business, Waylon says his education came in handy helping with the business, finance, and math aspects of starting a business. Every year, TRIO SSS hosts a holiday celebration for students in early December. TRIO students who finish a 2-year degree at Ivy Tech are encouraged to transfer to Purdue Fort Wayne to complete their 4-year degrees. Having SSS programs on both campuses makes for a great partnership and helps ensure there is a pipeline for first-generation students to pursue 4-year degrees with a cohesive support system. On average, between 5 -10% of TRIO SSS students at the university are transfer students.



## TRIO Students Visit Michigan



Every Fall Break, while other students are having a day off, TRIO students load a bus for an exciting cultural day-trip. This past fall, TRIO students embarked on a trip to Detroit, Michigan. Students toured the Henry Ford Museum and learned about the Ford Motor Company, while also getting a glimpse into past human and civil rights movements. Students got to see a variety of artifacts including: the Rosa Parks bus, Wright Brother's bicycle shop, Lincoln's chair from the Ford Theater, historical aircrafts, presidential cars, and even the Oscar Meyer Weinermobile!

On-site, students also explored Greenfield Village and learned about life during the turn-of-the-century by visiting replica homes, businesses, and shops. In the village, horse-drawn wagons and Model T cars buzzed by students as they stepped back in time and listened to the town's people tell about Henry Ford's childhood and life during the 1800s. Students were able to take a

literal "walk down Main Street" to experience what living during this changing time in history was really like.

Next, students visited the Holocaust Memorial Center. The Center explained the history of Jewish culture and beliefs before the rise of the Nazi party in Germany. The Center also offered students a reminder of the atrocities and persecution Jewish families (and others) faced in the 1930s and 1940s. The tour concluded with a survivor talk given by George Erdstein, an individual who had narrowly escaped the Holocaust himself as a child. George lost his grandparents in the Holocaust and almost his own father. Hearing the account from someone who had actually lived and experienced the fear firsthand was very powerful for the students. One student exclaimed, "All this, just because one man hated so much?!"

Students also viewed a railroad car that had once carried men, women, and children to the concentration camps. Although the visit had a heavy undertone, students left with a greater understanding of history and the struggles that others have faced due to religious persecution.



### TRIO Welcomes Largest New Group

Mirroring Purdue University Fort Wayne's increase in enrollment this past fall, TRIO SSS also welcomed its largest new student class ever. In August, 52 first-generation students joined Purdue Fort Wayne TRIO SSS. Students came from as far away as Florida and North Carolina. 



