

New Safety Measures at Commencement Made Easier with Earlier Access to Coliseum

For added peace of mind, all those wishing to enter the Coliseum's main arena before and during the 4 p.m. ceremony will participate in safety and security measures consistent with many major events across the country. All ceremony participants, students, and guests will pass through metal detectors, and bags and purses will be physically screened by security personnel. Small items such as keys, phones, and wallets may be carried by hand through one of 8–10 screening zones.

To accommodate these new steps, doors to the Coliseum will open earlier this year for ceremony participants and students, who may begin entering at 1 p.m. Guests may enter at 2 p.m.

The university and representatives of the Coliseum are in regular contact to review expected traffic patterns so the flow of individuals into the main arena can be completed as quickly as possible. Winners of 2024 Summit Scholars Competition to Receive Full, 4-year Scholarships to Purdue Fort Wayne

Purdue University Fort Wayne's annual effort to identify top high school seniors who, based on their academic merit and community involvement, will receive full, four-year scholarships to PFW has reached the moment of truth.

It's called the Summit Scholars Competition and the class of 2024–25 is made up of six students identified as Chapman Scholars and another who has earned the title of Doermer Distinguished Scholar.

Conducted remotely to encourage participation from applicants near and far—including those whose families may be facing a degree of financial insecurity that would make travel to Fort Wayne a hardship—this year's competition received a record 70 applications, which was a 25% increase from last year.
