GAIN REAL-WORLD EXPERIENCE

The Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology is a two-year, full-time program that includes graduate level coursework focusing on assessment and treatment of speech, language, and swallowing disorders across the lifespan. Throughout the program, coursework and clinical experiences are integrated so that students develop the knowledge and skills needed to successfully engage in evidence-based practice as a speech-language pathologist. During the first year of the program, students gain clinical experiences in the department's on-campus Communication Disorders Clinic. In the second year, students also complete clinical experiences in off-campus sites including schools, inpatient and outpatient medical settings, and skilled nursing facilities.

- Students progress through the program as a small cohort
- Classes co-taught by multiple faculty members to integrate content

COURSE SEQUENCE

The curriculum for the M.S. in Speech-Language Pathology is based on a cohort model in which students take the required courses in a set curriculum. Adhering to the specified sequence of courses is essential because each semester (except for summer semesters), students will enroll in one critical thinking course which emphasizes the integration of the knowledge and skills learned in the other required courses that semester. Therefore, to successfully participate in and benefit from those critical thinking courses, students must be enrolled in the full structured set of co-requisite courses each semester.

The degree is structured to be completed in six semesters of continuous full-time enrollment starting in a summer semester.

Applicants must apply through both the Purdue Graduate School and the Centralized Application Service for Communication Sciences & Disorders Programs (CSDCAS). Both applications are due by January 15.

ACCREDITATION STATUS

The Master of Science (M.S.) education program in speech-language pathology (residential) at Purdue University Fort Wayne is a Candidate for Accreditation by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology (CAA) of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, 2200 Research Boulevard, #310, Rockville, MD 20850, 800-498-2071 or 301-296- 5700.

Candidacy is a “pre-accreditation” status with the CAA, awarded to developing or emerging programs for a maximum period of 5 years.



STEPS TO APPLY - PURDUE GRADUATE SCHOOL

Application: Applicants must submit an application to the Purdue Graduate School. To begin your application, create an account through the portal at <https://www.purdue.edu/gradschool/admissions/how-to-apply/index.html>

Application Fee: The Graduate School application fee is \$60 (U.S. dollars) for domestic applicants and \$75 (U.S. dollars) for international applicants. Your application will not be processed until your nonrefundable application fee has been paid.

Transcripts: Through the application portal, you must upload transcript(s) for every institution of higher education you attended regardless of whether or not a degree was awarded. If a degree was awarded, then it must be printed on the transcripts. If no degree is printed on the transcripts then a copy of the original diploma (degree certificate) is needed. If the documents are not in English, you must upload an English translation certified by the college or university that issued it. All candidates must hold a four-year undergraduate degree or equivalent in any discipline from a recognized institution at the time they begin the program.

STEPS TO APPLY - CSDCAS APPLICATION

CSDCAS Application: Applicants must submit an application to Purdue University Fort Wayne through the CSDCAS system. To begin your application, create an account through CSDCAS at <https://csdcas.liaisoncas.org/>. Using the Add Program tab, search for Purdue University Fort Wayne and add it to your list of programs.

CSDCAS Fee: Applicants must pay the CSDCAS fee to submit an application. You do not need to pay to create a CSDCAS account, only when you submit an application.

Transcripts: Submit official transcripts from all colleges and universities you have attended.

Personal Essay: Upload a personal essay. The essay prompt is in the CSDCAS application.

Recommendations: In the Evaluations page of your CSDCAS application, enter the names and contact information for three individuals who are qualified to evaluate your academic performance and who can attest to your ability to pursue a graduate degree. When you create an evaluation request, each individual will receive instructions on how to submit their recommendation.

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS

You must provide official transcripts and/or academic records at the request of the graduate program or if you are admitted and choose to enroll. An official transcript bears the original signature of the registrar and/or the original seal of the issuing institution. An unofficial transcript printed from your current/previous institution(s) student system is not an acceptable document. Official documents should be submitted to:

Domestic transcripts must be sent directly from a Registrar's office to the Office of Graduate Admissions via mail or email.
