## PFW Celebrating Military Appreciation Day on Thursday

Purdue University Fort Wayne's annual Military Appreciation Day will be Thursday from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Science Mall.

The event will hopefully include a flyover from the 122nd Fighter Wing of the Indiana Air National Guard featuring two F-16s at approximately 11:11 a.m., weather permitting. The flyover is also subject to guidance from the wing. The significance of the timing is to remember the armistice that went into effect at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918, which signaled the end of what was at that time considered to be the "war to end all wars."

"We will have several activities that attendees can join including demonstrations of full military gear, a terrain display of a day in the field, a grenade toss, and a nonalcoholic Purdue Fort Wayne version of grog," said Nicole Welsh, senior compliance officer, Military Student Services. "There will also be an obstacle course that students can try, as well as food."

The event's goal is to bridge the gap between military and veteran students and more traditional students. **Military Student Services** annually works with more than 160 students.



#### Annual Constitution Day Observance Coming Next Week

Purdue University Fort Wayne's annual observance of Constitution Day will be held at Helmke Library on Sept. 17 starting at noon, 237 years after the original signing. Giveaways will include free pocket-sized copies of the Constitution, coloring pages, stickers, treats, and water. There will also be a Constitution trivia game hosted by the Department of Financial Aid.

Activities will kick off in the IDEASpace with a panel discussion on "The Roberts Court & The Constitution," hosted by the Department of Political Science. Participants include Benjamin Slomski, assistant professor; Georgia Wralstad Ulmschneider, professor emeritus; and Mike Wolf, professor, department chair, and interim director of the Mike Downs Center for Indiana Politics.

Starting at 2 p.m., there will be a reading of the Constitution by various members of the PFW university community outside the library along Mastodon Way.

The event counts toward students' civics literacy requirement.

The Constitution, whose preamble begins with the famous words "We the people," includes the seven articles that took effect in 1789. Twenty-seven amendments were added between 1791 and 1992; the first 10 are known as the Bill of Rights. The last amendment adopted prevents Congress members from granting themselves pay raises during the current session.
