\$1.77M NIH Grant Inspires Passion in PFW Students, Assistant Professor

Lisa McLellan, an assistant professor in the Department of Biological Sciences at Purdue University Fort Wayne, recently received a \$1.77 million grant from the National Institutes of Health. McLellan and Robert Shields, an assistant professor at Arkansas State University, are starting a five-year study of how bacteria cells in the human mouth exchange DNA and evolve. On average, the mouth has 20 billion bacteria representing 650 species. Some of these bacteria, which McLellan studies, cause dental cavities and diseases.

It's a critical issue as about 90% of adults in the U.S. have had at least one cavity sometime in

their lives, including 25% currently, costing \$136 billion annually. Further, every 15 seconds, someone visits an emergency room because of a dental condition.

"We can examine oral bacteria and their DNA and how that DNA is transferred from one bacterial cell to another," McLellan said. "Bacteria are constantly adapting to conditions in your mouth and potentially causing diseases. By understanding these processes, we can understand how these bacteria are evolving and think about ways we can better treat these bacteria. It's an important medical question."

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PFW Celebrates Dedication of W. Paul and Carolyn Wolf Bridge

Purdue University Fort Wayne dedicated on Monday afternoon the pedestrian bridge across Crescent Avenue that connects its Main and Waterfield campuses. Now named the W. Paul and Carolyn Wolf Bridge, the recognition honors the Wolfs' support of the university and commitment to Mastodon Athletics. Surrounded by student-athletes and coaches, Paul Wolf said he would like this span to also be viewed as the "Students' Future Career Bridge."

Even more than the honor, the Wolfs seemed to enjoy meeting the current Mastodons during a small reception afterward in the Development Building. Paul greeted more than a dozen student-athletes who were predominately products of northeast Indiana high schools, a theme important

to the Wolfs.

"Our hope is that more local students will consider coming here to study and compete in the future," Paul Wolf said. "I told several of them that they should go home and tell their mom and dad they did a real nice job. They are all just nice. When you have a faculty that is friendly, it flows through the students, and they in turn are going to produce that the rest of their lives and pass it on to their children."

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PFW Artwork on Display in Local Exhibition

Four Purdue University Fort Wayne faculty members are part of six artists featured until Oct. 20 at Crestwoods Frame Shop and Gallery, 314 N. Main St., in Roanoke.

The exhibition is called "Endangered Species: Environmental Ethics." Rebecca Coffman, chair of the Department of Art and Design and professor of ceramics; Derek Decker, Visual Arts Gallery coordinator and studio tech; John Hrehov, professor of drawing and painting; and Robert Schroeder, limited term lecturer, are presenting pieces. Their works include painting, drawing, sculpture, ceramics, and metalsmithing.

According to Crestwoods, "The artists have focused on many endangered species within our complex world. All of these threatened creatures are at high risk of eventual extinction due to human manipulation of the natural world. Including us, our fragile existence relies on finite resources on this planet."

The show opened Sept. 14. The gallery's hours are Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free. More information and samples of the artists' work, which is available for purchase, can be found on the gallery's **Facebook** page.

Song of My Blood Performance Coming to Campus Saturday

A handful of Purdue University Fort Wayne departments are sponsoring a unique cultural music experience on Saturday at 6:30 p.m. in the Music Center. "Canturia de Mi Sangre," or "Song of My Blood," honors the universal poetry of Gabriela Mistral, the first Latin American to receive the Nobel Prize in literature. The concert includes original compositions inspired by Mistral's work, weaving, past, present, and future.

The event is free to attend and is organized by **Bridging Worlds**, a Fort Wayne-based cross-cultural arts and education organization, which is hosting musicians Kike Galdames and Claudio Gonzalez from Chile.
