Chen, PFW Help Allen County Land \$1.7M Grant for Battery Recycling

Purdue University Fort Wayne has entered into a collaboration that could potentially make it a local and state leader in lithium battery recycling. Under the leadership of Bin Chen, associate professor of electrical and computer engineering, the university helped Allen County receive a \$1.7M grant from the Department of Energy for a three-year study that was announced Monday afternoon during a news conference at the Rousseau Centre in downtown Fort Wayne.

“It’s really exciting for us as an institution to be able to utilize the intellectual capital of our faculty and students in a way that truly benefits the region,” said Carl Drummond, provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs at Purdue Fort Wayne.

Drummond said the project could provide technical training and research opportunities for as many as 50 PFW students over the three years.

TRIO Provides Support, Guidance for First-Generation Students

Sitting in the middle of a five-student panel during TRIO’s First-Generation Celebration on Nov. 6, Aurea Alconera decided to show how much she’s evolved in two years at Purdue University Fort Wayne. The question was, “What advice would you give other first-generation students?”

“Imposter syndrome is very real,” said Alconera, a senior majoring in psychology, who leaned forward into the microphone to deliver her answer. “If you are going through it, or are still experiencing it, that is valid. However, that is not who you are. That is not your identity. Even if you feel that you can’t get past this, just say yes to a lot of things because that will present a lot of opportunities for you and your future. Don’t let imposter syndrome be your identity because it will never be who you are.”

Located in Kettler Hall, Room G25, **TRIO Student Support Services** helps first-generation students find the support they need through mentoring, workshops, counseling, tutoring, special functions, and employment opportunities. There is no fee to join, and nearly 200 students are part of the program this semester.

PFW's Liu Selected to Head Quantum Computing Team

An associate professor at Purdue University Fort Wayne is teaming with four Arizona State University faculty on a \$300,000 National Science Foundation Cyber Training Initiative grant. David Liu of PFW's Department of Computer Science is the project leader for a two-year program teaching graduate and research students the fundamentals of quantum computing, emphasizing materials science and chemistry.

"Quantum computers are a new way to compute based on quantum mechanics," Liu said. "Some things it would take a supercomputer thousands of years, a quantum computer could do in maybe a couple of hours. It's revolutionary and changes everything."

The project will provide 80 students and researchers from across the country with experience using state-of-the-art quantum computers and Qiskit quantum computing framework from IBM

and CUDA-Q—an open-source development platform from Nvidia—and higher-performance computers at Purdue West Lafayette and Arizona State. The goal is to develop a diverse, quantum-ready workforce capable of filling vital jobs that advance quantum technologies, promote national security, and strengthen economic growth.
